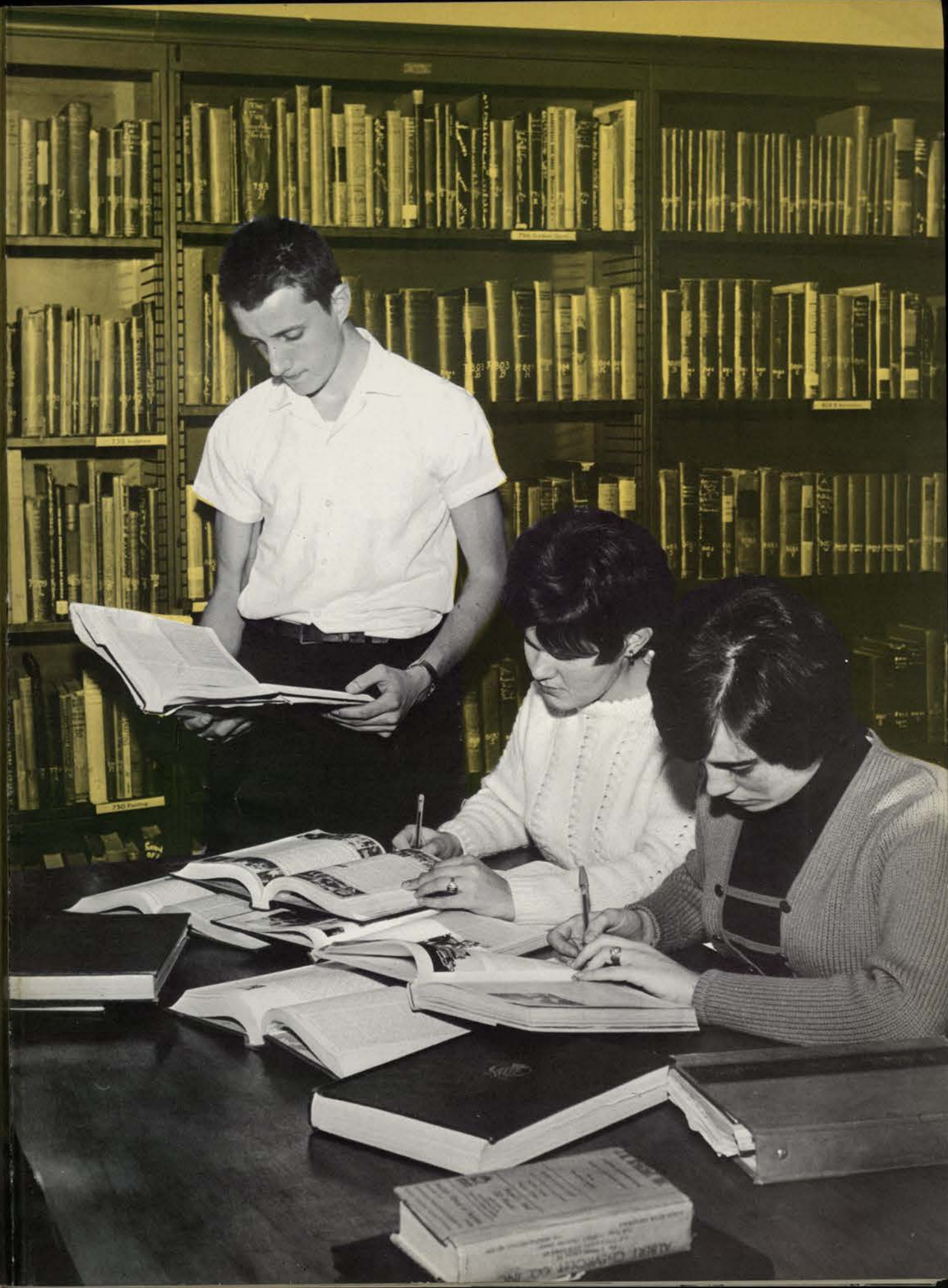

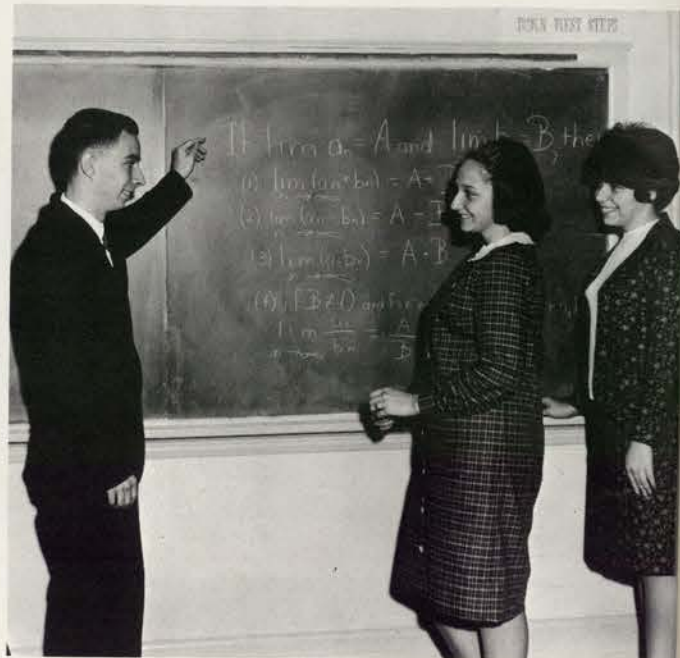

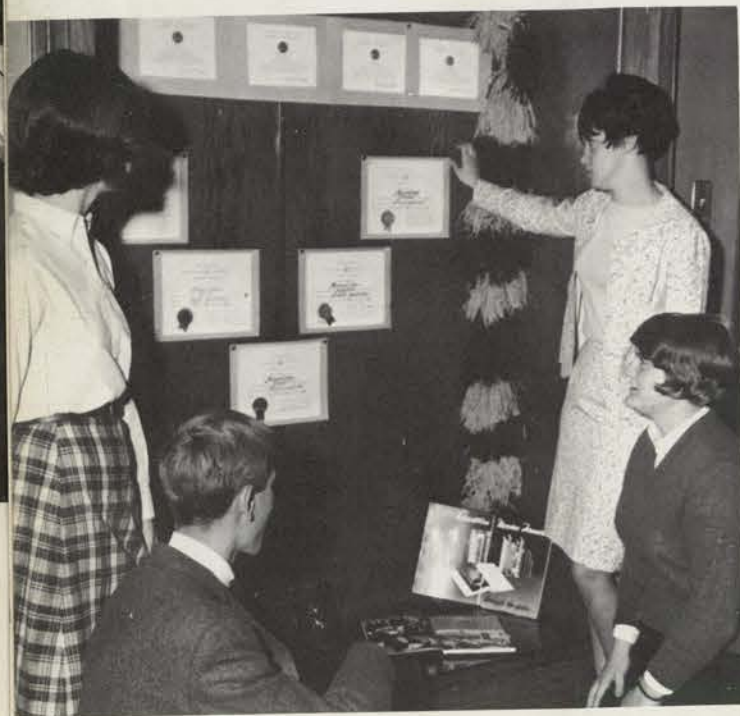

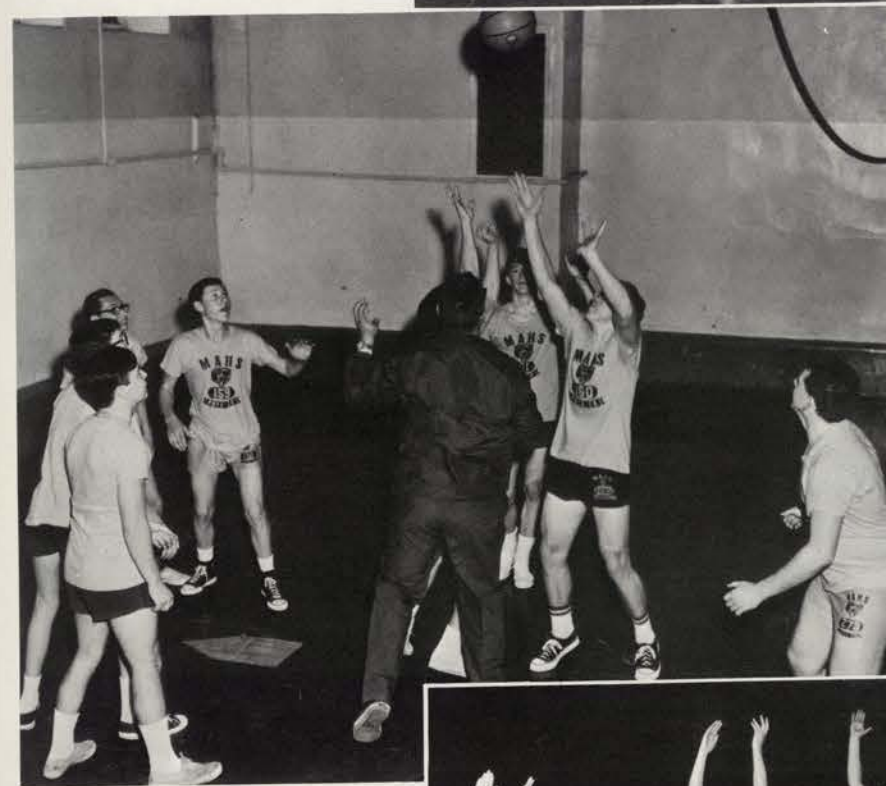

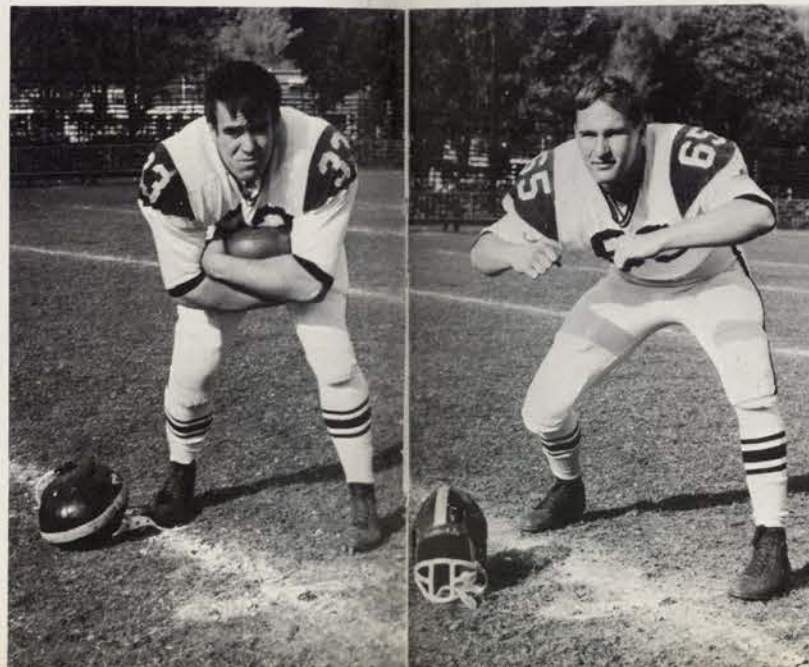

Beginning the season on September 10 under new Coach Bill Jones, the Mahanoy Area Golden Bears invaded Saint Clair to do battle with the Saints. The Saints scored early on a long punt return, while the Bears picked up a touchdown on a run by McCarroll early in the third quarter; the teams played on even terms the rest of the way to a 6-6 stalemate.

The first home game saw the Bears doing battle with a heavily favored Pottsville team. The first half was truly an exciting one with Pottsville holding a slim 7-0 lead, on a run by Glenn, as they headed for the locker room. On the kickoff opening the second half, Guers went 80 yards for the Crimson Tide and moments later Glenn scored again to break the game open. McCarroll tallied for Mahanoy late in the fourth quarter, but it was too late, as the Tide had beaten the Bears, 19-7. Traveling to the Silver Bowl in Mt. Carmel to play the Tornados, the Bears finished on the short end of a 31-0 score, never mounting an offensive threat as All-State quarterback, Greg Doviak, led Mt. Carmel to victory.

Traveling to Shamokin, the Bears ran into a highly-touted eleven and were trounced badly, 33-0. On their home ground with Hazleton, the locals displayed erratic defense in first half, gaining some union later but losing, 28-0. Moving into Schuylkill Haven, the Bears found themselves in the unfamiliar roll of favorites. The power running of Fran McCarroll and Fred Petritsch proved too much for the Havenites and the Bears won, 39-7. The locals returned home to engage Minersville in a game that was billed as a toss up. Again

Mahanoy's offense stumbled as two long pass-plays gave the Miners touchdowns and a 19-0 blanking of the Bears.

The Blue Raiders of Tamaqua completely dominated play as the Bears were again outclassed, 27-6, with Francy McCarroll picking up the only Mahanoy touchdown on a 4 yard run. Mahanoy fans had something to cheer about as the Bears, playing the role of underdogs, upset a highly-touted North Schuylkill eleven, 18-7. The power running of McCarroll, who scored two touchdowns and quick hitting of Fred Petritsch, along with a stern defense, paved the way to victory. The Shenandoah game, a tilt between two rivals of many years standing, brought to a close a season that was filled with trouble for the Mahanoy Area Eleven. The Golden Bears lost some of their usual luster in the 1966 football season — a time of building rather than finished achievement. The final tally of 2-7-1 did not dim the enthusiasm of strong football fans who have a loyal interest in The Golden Bears — win or lose.

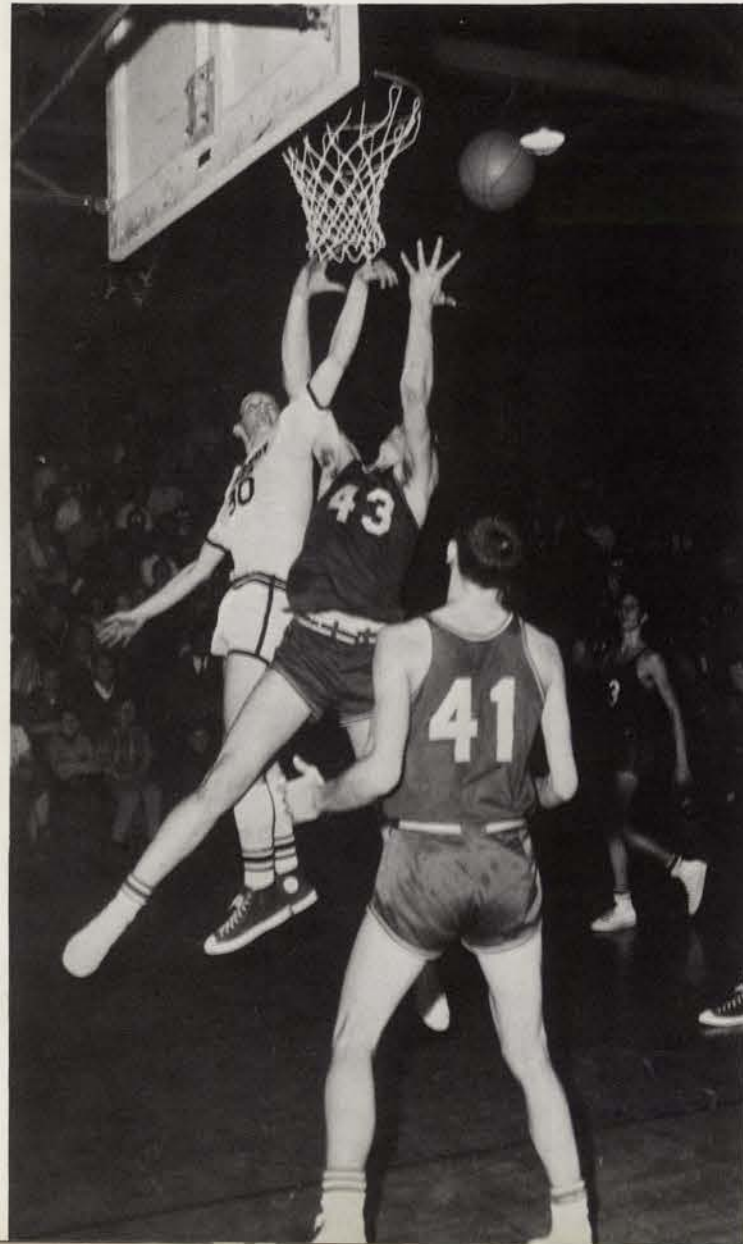

And Win Honors With Best Offensive Average in Circuit

Mahanoy Area opened its season with a 96-68 conquest of Tamaqua as Clarence Mack flooded the Blue Raiders' defense with 34 points. In their first North Schuylkill League game, the Bears mauled Minersville, 104-73, and continued to score at will as Nativity fell, 110-59.

The Bears, 48 game winning streak came to an end as Panther Valley upended them, 79-77. Mack led the Bears with 28 while Pilconis headed the Panthers with his 32. The Mahanoy offensive machine flew into high gear as they successively leveled Blue Mt., 104-61, North Schuylkill, 122-75, and St. Clair, 101-82. Shenandoah made a futile effort to stop the Bears but were defeated, 94-78. Scruylkill Haven was next to fall, 106-88. In the following game, the Bears were surprised by Pine Grove's win, 97-85, despite a 36 point performance by Mack. Mahanoy finished their first half with a 72-63 victory over Mt. Carmel as Mack and Holland combined for 50 points.

Opening the second half the Bears routed Minersville, 102-81, when Holland and Mack hit for 31 and 30 points respectively. Mahanoy lost to Panther Valley for the second time, 84-70, as the Panthers remained unbeaten. The Bears returned home and lambled Blue Mt., 100-48, as Mack hit for 39. In what could be termed the upset of the year North Schuylkill dumped Mahanoy, 66-57. Returning to their winning ways the Bears toppled St. Clair, 99-76 and Shenandoah, 77-65. A determined Schuylkill Haven team tried to down the Bears but were defeated, 84-75. Playing their best game of the season the Bears gained revenge for an earlier loss by ripping Pine Grove, 70-54, then piled up an 86-74 score over Mt. Carmel and closed their regular season by routing Nativity, 103-70.

Moving into Allentown, the Bears edged Whitehall at Mulhenberg College, 61-53. Although the Zephers were the favorites going into the game, the clutch shooting of Mack, Holland, and Billy Linkchorst proved to be the difference. Allentown Dieruff defeated the Bears, 57-49, in the District 11 final at the Harrisburg Farm Show Arena. The Huskies' excellent foul shooting and superior height proved too much for the Bears.

The Bears end the 1966-67 court season with an impressive 18-5 record. This also ended the court careers of Billy Linkchorst, Mickey Holland, Clarence Mack, Billy Leitzel and Leonard Dalinsky. Mack ended his final season with top scoring honors in North Schuylkill League with a 26 points per game average. Holland finished fourth. Best offensive average in the circuit was made by the Bears.



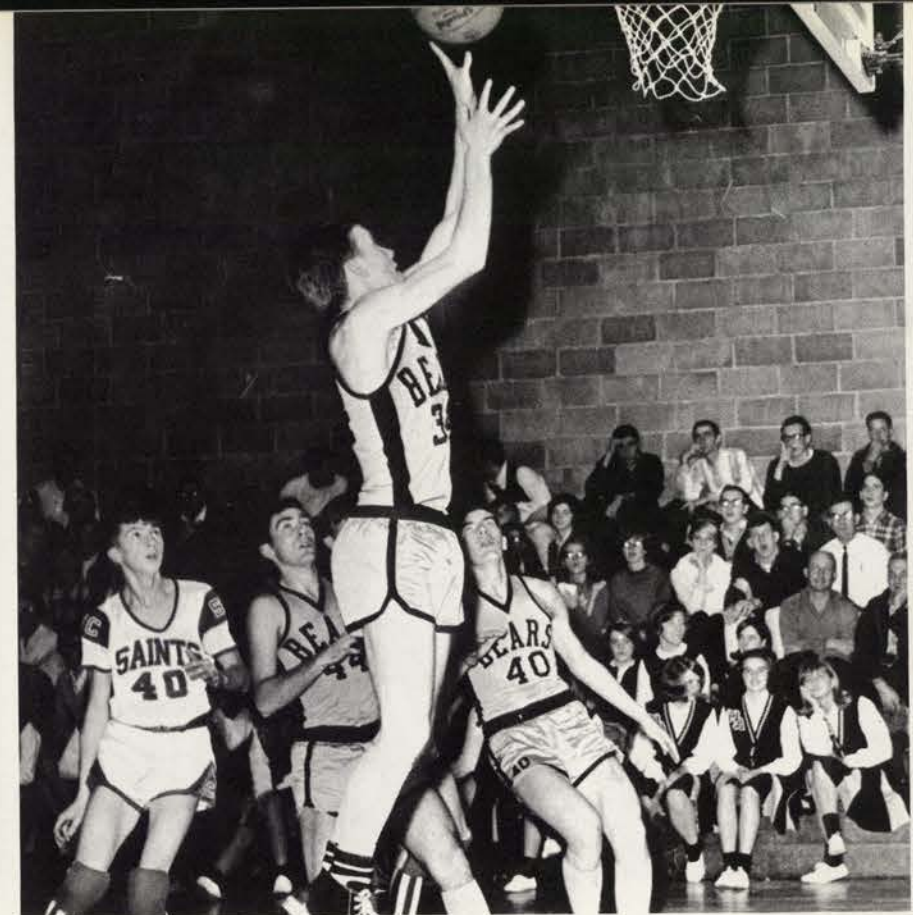
